

Review of: "'Women come out for less important tasks': Understanding the reality of the gendered transport sector in Karachi through Key-Informant Interviews"

The article discusses an important topic, the author raises the issue of gender versus transportation. He argues that women's mobility can be improved by changing the mindset of transport planners. However, equality and inclusion requires a special culture, where the civil society, the government, and all stakeholders should believe in. It is a common problem in developing countries, where gender issues relate to norms, social, or religious beliefs. A perfect transport master plan will not solve the problems. My comments are the following:

- The title needs to be shortened,
- The Author relies on data collection, which is not quite recent, numbers could have been updated.
- There is an overlap between the introduction and the background, The author should introduce the article, then proceed to the background to engage with the reader.
- The questionnaire addressed to key informants should have included direct questions about gender issue. It is not clear why the author avoided to tackle the issue directly.
- The article is informative.
