

Review of: "[Essay] Not Quite Like Us? — Can Cyborgs and Intelligent Machines Be Natural Persons as a Matter of Law?"

The paper deals with the theme of artificial intelligence and focuses on the possibility of attributing a legal subjectivity to computers and robot.

The essay is interesting because it deals not only with the juridical aspects, but also with those of philosophy and medicine.

The essay is clear and original and the arguments supported by the Author are valid.

The essay is substantially complete, although not excessively long.

The paragraphs are well connected to each other and consequential, both from a logical and an argumentative point of view.

The thesis supported by the author is persuasive, credible and sufficiently original.

The normative and doctrinal sources are pertinent and adequate, above all in terms of quality.

The bibliographic notes support the discussion well.

The essay could be further developed, referring to the theme of the legal subjectivity of all non-human entities, not just computers and robots: think, for example, of the question of attributing responsibility for self-driving cars.

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
