

Review of: "Assessing the Impact of COVID-19 on Food Consumption Preferences"

The manuscript presented for review presents the current problem of the impact of the Covid-19 situation on food consumption in the region of Kamuli C village, found in Kireka Parish in Kira Municipality in Uganda. Due to the reviewer, I have a few comments that should improve the quality of the manuscript:

Ad. 1. Figure 3 is illegible in the caption on the X axis. It should be, for example, 10-20, not 10 to 20, etc.

Ad. 2. In general, the chapter "research methodology" should be supplemented with a description of which statistical indicators and equations and calculations were used to interpret the research and for what purpose.

Ad. 3. Chapter 3 entitled "Statistical Analysis" is misleading, it should be called "Research Results" as it describes the results obtained, not statistical indicators.

Ad. 4. Figure 5 and Table 3 show the same. You must decide on one way to present the same results. The same applies to Table 4 and Figure 6.

Ad. 5. The "Discussion" section is definitely too short, it should be expanded.

Ad. 6. I would tidy up the chapter "Conclusions and recommendation". It is preferable to list the conclusions.

Ad. 7. Literature should be supplemented with at least 10 items, which should be used in the extended "Discussion" chapter. Literature items should not be older than 2015. The 2006 literature item should be replaced with a new one.

Ad. 8. According to the general standards of writing a scientific paper, captions of tables should be above the table, and captions of figures below the figure. Please move the table captions to the appropriate place, then it will be clearer.

Ad. 9. The entire text of the manuscript is too fragmented with gaps and spaces. Couldn't this be more organized?

I believe, that after taking into account my comments, the text will be more readable and clear, and will provide valuable information on food consumption in the researched region of Uganda.
