I am awarding a single star to the Qeios website due to the manuscript's absence of page numbers and line numbering. The article presents several significant inaccuracies. Specifically, the meaning of the phrase "strategies employed by these two nations" remains ambiguous. Would it not be more appropriate to use the term 'governments'? Additionally, I failed to find the "in-depth analysis of Sweden's sustainability model" that was promised in the abstract.

The text clearly juxtaposes a highly developed country with a developing one, notably in the context of access to fresh water and electricity. Table 1 does not enhance the content in any meaningful way and, conversely, prompts further queries about its relevance. The article's approach of merely comparing countries amplifies existing stereotypes and fails to provide novel insights. There is an evident lack of quantitative data. An in-depth data analysis related to the selected sector would not only have been more enlightening but also instrumental in determining a suitable journal for publication.

The article does not offer actionable recommendations or articulate its theoretical contributions. I would appreciate clarity on what this article contributes to academic discourse and the specific problem it addresses. Moreover, I suggest highlighting the potential implications and subsequent impact on business practices that managerial staff can harness.

I recommend referencing scholars outside of Sweden and India who have contributed to this topic. Furthermore, I urge you to contemplate the most appropriate journal for your submission, bearing in mind the stylistic conventions of articles already published therein. It's also imperative to devise a title that distinguishes your work from myriad other articles.

A possible improved title might be: "Sustainability in Contrast: How Sweden and India Address Climate Change".
