- 2. Regarding new classes of antibiotics available for coping up with AMR, we need to think about other options too, such as combination drug therapies and other remedies. Do doctors think about these alternatives before prescribing antibiotics?
- 3. The articles included here were only 11. Maybe more articles have been published since then. More papers will provide more data on the subject, and the results obtained will be valuable.
- 4. Figure No. 3 is not understandable. Explain the numbers used in the figure or below the figure. You can also change the model of the figure. It needs some changes to make it more informative.
- 5. Overall, this systematic review is nice, but to make it more substantial and relevant now, more recent data needs to be incorporated.
