In the peyote discussion, it's repeated "cactus pudding." Above and below figure 44, the scientific name of peyote has a capital letter in the species several times along the text.

Although it is grammatically correct, the term 'Aborigine(s)' has negative connotations and should be avoided. Sometimes it's used indigenous people, other aborigines.
