This article offers a new and easily overlooked perspective on today's global geopolitics that looks beyond Western-centrism. There are many strengths in this article, and I won't list them all.

With regard to this article, perhaps the following points could be a better way to enhance its persuasiveness.

- 1) About the literature review. Readers may want to know more information about how previous scholars have addressed the geopolitical structure of international politics, and this article does not seem to have set up such a target well enough to be able to make this article's argument more purposeful and critical.
- 2) On methodology. Possibly limited by space, the article does not reflect the research methodology, i.e. how the author conducted this research.
- 3) About the argument. What are the "roots of cultural ideology" in the title of the article? The article does not seem to have a clear and focused discussion. In addition, the fifth section, "What are the viable alternatives today?" also seems to be superficial and does not lead to the desired, complete point.
- 4) Conclusion. The article does not seem to conclude by summarizing and reiterating its points to the reader, echoing what is mentioned in the abstract. A strong conclusion is necessary for the structural integrity of the article.
