

Review of: "Resentment and Multiculturalism: Kymlicka's Canada, Bonilla Maldonado's Colombia and Modood's UK"

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The article constructs validated hypotheses, from the perspective of various authors who are authorities on the subject, on the way in which multiculturalism in today's global, hybrid and interconnected world is linked to theoretical approaches and social policies, whose objective is to promote active interaction between collectives and individuals from various social groups. The perspective of Will Kymlicka, and his liberal democratic approach linked to Human Rights, is accurately compared with those of the Colombian researchers Daniel Bonilla Maldono and Héctor Alonso Moreno Parra, who have carried out studies on multiculturalism in the Colombian Constitution of 91, recognized for its cultural and ethnic diversity, and as widely participatory and democratic. These comparisons are valid in the sense of providing relevant theoretical frameworks and relevant policies for the insertion of the migrant, Afro and indigenous population into contemporary Colombia. Finally, the analysis is based on the Canadian Doug Saunders, who exposes the situation of immigrants in Canadian slums and suburbs, highlighting the relationship between economic well-being and multiculturalism. The article's approaches are relevant to conclude that most thinkers have not broadly considered the impact of globalization, the migration and refugee crisis, so important in the current context due to the conflicts in Ukraine and Israel. Due to such academic and theoretical contributions, I consider that the article should be published, without further corrections.

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
