Thank you for the opportunity to review the article titled 'Allergies in India: Myths, Misconceptions and Awareness'. The article studied and important and contemporary topic and the authors need to be complimented for the same. Following are the observations -

- 1. The authors need to elaborate on the introduction giving references to studies on similar topicsat national and internationa level.
- 2. Methodology need to be worked out better. E.g. who diagnosed or how were the diseases included diagnosed?
- 3. What was the method of selecting the study subjects or how was sampling conducted?
- 4. This was the era of COVID 19. So why was it not considered in inclusion or exclusion criteria given its predominantly respiratory nature of symptoms.
- 5. Was the questionnaire pre-tested? Was it standardized? In view of subjects not being conversant in English was translation and backtranslation to vernacular language used?
- 6. Most questions appear to be leading and needed to be deliberately made. E.g. Q13 on steroids.
- 7. Q 3 and Q 12 have two different questions rolled into one. E.g. Q3 Infectious and contagious or Q 12 Dependence and damage to lungs. A Yes or No answer to one could be interpreted as answer to any or both parts of the question.
- 8. Authors need to prepare detailed analysis with tables or graphs.
- 9. Discussion needs more deliberation. Socio -demographic characteristic should have been studied in association with the allergy questionnaire to give a meaningful impact of the article. Answers could be bunched up to determine which are the domains where awareness was lacking.
- 10. Conclusions needs to be in more detail.
