- This paper did no add novel empirical data to feminist's research related to empowerment of women in Ethiopia and Kenya.
- 2. It's hard to put women from Ethiopia and women from Kenya together in the same situation. These women are related to different cultures, their circumstances and needs are also different.
- 3. It's not possible to examine the government's policy in Ethiopia and Kenya from the same perspective; the two countries have different social and economic formations. In this case, it's better to conduct comparative studies.
- 4. The authors indicated that the paper is based on a field research, but indeed, they relied on available data. They should listen to women; every single woman in her daily life has her own story to tell.
- 5. The authors were supposed to select a random sample from each country to conduct a study based on direct interviews and focus groups with women from both countries.
- 6. There is a clear overlap between the literature review and the findings of the study and there is no logical analysis.
- 7. The authors did not rely on new sources of information from Ethiopian and Kenyan governments about the empowerment of women.
- 8. The research is not suitable for publication, the authors should conduct an empirical field research
