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As I read through this article, I kept wondering why there is not more contextualization of the deconstruction and reconstruction of the geopolitical world. For example, why was the influence of the search for riches (colonization for economics and just religion) not brought into the argument sooner? "To reduce this complexity to a specific phase in time (16th Century) and to a very tiny part of the globe (Westphalia in Germany) and draw general conclusions out of it is indeed an adventurous attempt- to say the least.
