The topic addressed in the article is interesting and relevant to the community, especially due to its ethnobotanical value. However, there are some parts of the text that need to be reviewed.

There is no clear objective stated for this article in the abstract or introduction. Upon reading the manuscript, the purpose of the work is not specified at any point. Please make this clearer.

Write the species name, indicating the author who identified it and its family: Acacia pycnantha Benth. (Fabaceae) in the first line of the abstract and the first line of the introduction.

Standardize the use of the acronym "AP" throughout the text.

When referring to the genus Acacia, always capitalize the first letter and use italics.

In "Approximately (≈) 40% of trees had gum...," there may not be a need to explain the meaning of this symbol. It is generally understood and can be omitted.

Reference "Figure 1." in the text. In Figure B, zoom in to show the gum or indicate its location with an arrow. In the current photo, it is not visible and may confuse the reader.
