Although the paper constructs a convincing and well-thought-out mind path regarding the processes involved in the social structures leading to human prosperity, several of the founding blocks are laid out on either personal ideas or assumptions, not backed up by fundamental ideas already introduced in philosophy, social and political science. Personally, I like the approach of the author and the pathway through which the conclusions have been reached; however, I do believe that numerous references from Aristotle and Plato, to John Locke, Adam Smith, and Schumpeter (to mention a few) should have been linked appropriately. The main idea is interesting, but I believe it needs a more rigorous and in-depth analysis, not fundamentally built on the work of the author.
