- -Which is right to use, 'one health,' 'One Health,' or 'one health'? Because all three forms are there in this document.
- 1. Interconnectedness of Human, Animal, and Environmental Health
- -I think it is more possible to make the review detailed. For instance, the impact of human-environment interaction on mosquito-borne disease control or eradication programs. Similarly, the effect of overlooking animal health on the programmes by supporting with some research evidence (maybe specific to the diseases).
- -On the other hand, it would have been nice if the major mosquito groups could be characterized in terms of their geographical distribution, habitat preference, and the change in trends due to humans' environmentally unfriendly activities. And the change in global distribution of respective diseases. For example, Dengue fever, which was previously limited to some tropical and sub-tropical regions, is now becoming a global threat.
