

## Review of: "Ecosystem Services Inequality Driven by Agroextractivism in Salamina, Colombia: A Critical Institutional Analysis"

I read this manuscript with much pleasure, acknowledging that I was learning a lot about the theoretical foundations of ES governance and the reproduction of inequalities. My experience in observing the reproduction of inequalities is linked to conservation interventions (not to cash crop production of healthy food for the global market) and to the major economic divide between poor communities who lose access to resources without compensation and comparatively rich local and international conservation agents whose high salaries are paid by global funds aimed at CC mitigation and biodiversity conservation; this means that ES provision is delocalized from the local to the global level without any compensation for local users. In saying this, I want to stress that this manuscript is of high relevance to a wide scientific audience dealing with ES governance in general and climate justice in particular. I totally agree with the former reviewers that the manuscript is very well written and both theoretically and methodologically deep and well-rooted. Thus, I also strongly recommend the publication of the manuscript with the minor revisions suggested by them.
