First of all, I would like to thank you for this study which will contribute to the science.

The first point that attracted my attention in the study was the absence of a mixed method question. In mixed method studies, the mixed method question should be added as a research question. For example, whether quantitative results are confirmed by qualitative results.

When I looked at the method section of the research, I saw that there was a little bit of confusion. The combination of quantitative and qualitative studies cannot be considered as a mixed method. In mixed method, it is recommended that both groups should be similar and the study should be a continuation of the study. The fact that school principals were interviewed after the teachers shows that there were two different studies. It can be called a case study instead of mixed method.

I would also recommend that the qualitative part of the research should include examples from the interviews and user experiences. It would also be appropriate for reliability to include personalised quotations.

In the conclusion part, it is seen that quantitative and qualitative data are analysed separately. In mixed method studies, the question you specify as the research question must have an answer. As can be understood from the result part, two quantitative and qualitative studies are combined. Therefore, it would be more accurate to call it a case study.
