Dr. Jan-Boje Frauen's article, "The Unavoidable Order of Things': Fabricated Resistance in George Orwell's 1984" is a well-written, precise, and informed piece of writing. This article offers an insightful, original, and detailed view about Orwell's *1984*. The author had chosen the textual evidence from the telling passages and incidents of the book. The discussion runs smoothly and orderly, including a brilliant analysis of the relationship of hate and sex which I deem is very interesting and potentially a point to develop comparisons with other texts. I have three suggestions which I think would make this article more organised and compatible with the currents of literary analysis. First, I think it is more customary for abstracts of scholarly papers to be written in form of one single paragraph without any splits. Moreover, as abstracts are supposed to highlight our contribution, it is not recommended to introduce other author's quotes and ideas in this section. Second, if we discuss topics such as "authentic humanity," it would be more reliable if we add references to theories and approaches related to this subject matter. This would help the author to look more justifying as there exists a framework of ideas that support the argument. Third, it is more advisable for the conclusion to be written, wholly, in the words of the authors. The conclusion of this paper seems to be more of a literature review. I suggest attaching the references included in the conclusion to the discussion part and a revision of the last section. Finally, once again I like to congratulate Dr. Jan-Boje Frauen for this original and to-the-point argument and express my happiness in having the chance for reading and reviewing this article.
