Title and introduction

For me, this article is very interesting, because there are new ideas presented. You collect the results of previous research/research.

But after I read it, I think the title "management" is too broad, compared to the content of the article which examines more about "planning". The introduction should emphasize the importance of ICT management for organizational success.

#### Literature Review

Based on the title, in the literature review the researcher should explain the concepts of "management", "ICT management", "sustainability" and "success", not studying ICT, but emphasizing ICT management.

- 2) The content of the literature review contradicts the title "management", while the content of the literature review is the opposite, ICT plays the role of manager, even though it should explain ICT management.
- 3) Based on this description, I think the literature review is weak. It would be better if you studied point 1.

### methodology

The research method is unclear.

It seems that this methodology needs to be explained in a more structured way.

#### discussion

The discussion in the discussion section seems very simple, not supported by many previous research results.
