The article is well structured, addresses a topical issue and presents a case study on how a democratic participatory process can be used to implement environmental sustainability projects in the form of participatory budgeting at a Thai university.

The importance of a participatory process over consultation is emphasised. The data collection based on a qualitative method (questionnaire) relating to the projects selected and implemented, and the two research questions can be seen as a distinguish feature.

However, it would have been interesting to know the total number of academic staff, support staff, students and others to assess the real impact of such a policy in a Thai university. I also recommend a thorough and detailed discussion of the policy implications of this research.
