

Review of: "The Role of Platelet Rich Plasma Injections in Cases of Stress Incontinence"

The work mentions the application of platelet-rich plasma as a non-invasive treatment, it would be better to say minimally invasive, since the injection itself is an invasive procedure, as mentioned later in the conclusion. As exclusion criteria, they did not take into account collagen diseases, which could condition or favor the development of urinary incontinence. Since the best result was obtained in patients under 50 years of age, it would be interesting to carry out a study with patients who have received the treatment for a period of more than one year, with longer follow-up, to verify its long-term effectiveness. The application of PRP has shown utility in various specialties, which is why it constitutes a great therapy for the pathology described in initial or mild to moderate cases. I suggest performing urodynamic studies, before and after, to verify the effectiveness of the improvement after treatment, as a complement to the application of the questionnaires.
