This would offer a more global context for the findings and help in understanding whether the challenges and dynamics observed in the Middle East and Africa are unique or part of a broader global trend.

While the author has done a commendable job of highlighting the specific context of sports officiating in the Middle East and Africa, it could delve deeper into the broader implications of these findings for sports management and policy. This would help in understanding the practical applications of the research and its relevance to sports governance globally.
