

Review of: "Character Development of The Nation's Next Generation In Terms of Reading Habits In The Midst of Sophistication of Technology 5.0"

Although it is an interesting topic, the article is disappointing:

- The historiography on 'what is reading' is adequate (although somewhat outdated), but it is not connected to the main question: how can personal growth/character development issues be related to reading (and reading education, the historiography of this research field is not discussed)
- A historiography and reading of existing literature of reading habits is also lacking
- The actual analysis is, according to the author, based on literature already published on this topic, but here I see only articles in magazines or papers, not journals, to sustain claims
- The concept "personal growth/character development" (central to the article) is explained in terms of Christian/biblical ideals (which could be fine, if paired with other ideologies or at least the recognition that "character development" can also be looked upon differently)
