I have read with interest the paper entitled "Graft Angiography Through Right Radial Artery: A Retrospective Cohort Study". The idea behind this work is certainly interesting, but the paper is not so original. In literature, there are a lot of papers about this topic, including many more patients (<https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/25791214/> - <https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/27372195/>). The paper offers a good overview of the most important clinical and instrumental issues regarding angiography through the radial artery. It is clearly written. There are no special ethical concerns. I think the major foul of the paper is the title, which is unclear: Which type of *graft* are we talking about? What type of *angiography*? It is necessary to read the article to comprehend that we are talking about coronary angiograms. The authors could add the term *coronary* to the title. In addition, in my opinion, there are many issues that should be investigated, such as operators' experience or the use of pressure devices.
