The exploration of ethical dimensions, including intergenerational equity and global inequity, is challenging. As improvements, I suggest the text focus more on key arguments and evidence, avoiding unnecessary digressions, which would increase clarity and impact. Providing more recent scientific data and examples to support assertions and enhance relevance is essential. Maintaining a balanced tone that acknowledges challenges while also highlighting opportunities for meaningful action would improve reader engagement.
