

Review of: "International Non-Governmental Organizations (INGOs) in Humanitarian Field: why and how to engage with Planetary Health?"

The paper uses the term "Anthropocene" in the abstract then again in the 3rd paragraph of the 2nd page. It seems the authors assume that this is commonly understood term. that all readers will know the meaning of the term.

Anthropocene, which I understand to mean the human impacts on the planet, could be explained to make the paper more accessible. My recommendation is to briefly explain the term when it is first used.

It is good practice to explain terms that are not in everyday use when they are first introduced as this will make your papers more accessible to a wider audience.

You may also wish to consider the following with respect to the paper's narrative flow:

- The **Introduction** focuses heavily on the Turkey earthquake example without a robust link to the main arguments. Your **Introduction** could be tweaked to foreshadow the core arguments. The overall issue could also be more clearly framed from the outset.
- The background on '**Climate Crisis**' has a logical flow; this element of the paper could be tightened by reducing repetition of similar points. You should consider streamline this for ease of reading.
- The '**Planetary Health**' introduction effectively transitions into the concept of planetary health and its potential value; however, the indigenous knowledge aspect could be better connected. You should consider integrating the indigenous knowledge piece more tightly.
- Broad suggestions could be made more concrete with examples.
- You would benefit from strengthening the closure by tying it back to the opening, as currently the paper ends a tad abruptly.

Overall, the main narrative arc is reasonably clear, but targeted changes to the intro/background, indigenous knowledge section, adding examples, and tightening the conclusion could make the flow more seamless and engaging.
