Review of: "Healthspan Horizon — Pioneering Preventive Care as the New Standard of Healthcare"

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Healthcare Benefits

While preventive medicine offers clear advantages, the manuscript occasionally presents prevention as universally cost-saving and outcome-improving without acknowledging:

Mixed evidence regarding the long-term economic efficiency of screening programs

Potential overdiagnosis and overtreatment risks

Health equity challenges related to digital health adoption

A more balanced discussion would improve scientific neutrality.

3. Ambiguity in Implementation Pathways

The article identifies multiple stakeholders but provides limited actionable detail regarding:

Integration into existing reimbursement models

Workforce training requirements

Regulatory harmonization across healthcare systems

Strategies for scaling preventive technologies in resource-limited settings

Clarifying operational frameworks would increase translational value.

4. Investor-Driven Innovation Emphasis

The discussion places substantial emphasis on startups and investors as drivers of preventive healthcare transformation. While valid, this perspective may underrepresent:

Public health infrastructure roles

Government policy and payer system reform

Community-level preventive interventions

A more balanced multi-sectoral approach would strengthen policy applicability.

Minor Concerns

Several sections contain broad visionary statements that could benefit from tighter structuring.

Some terminology (e.g., “kairos vs chronos”) is conceptually interesting but may reduce clarity for clinical readers.

The manuscript could improve by including measurable indicators of healthspan success.
