

# Review of: "The essence of ChatGPT is the subversion brought about by the combination of "technologized society" and "societized technology": "society technologization" and "technology socialization""

This is not, in its current form, an academic article; it might work as a blog post, or other opinion piece, but does not meet the expectations for scholarly work. The draft provides a view about how terms relating to ChatGPT might be understood, but does not relate those ideas to existing debates (in any field). As such there is no way to determine what contribution this article might make.

The consequence of this is that the article is superficial. It draws in neither empirical evidence nor theory. Assertions are made but not substantiated. Any new ideas that there may be within the piece (and it is hard to tell what is new, since no precedents are acknowledged) cannot be evaluated as they are not related to prior work.

In offering an opinion about this important area, but failing to acknowledge the existing scholarship that is relevant to the work, this piece undermines efforts to approach technological developments in a scholarly way.
