

Review of: "The Impact of Project Financial Subsidies on Project Achievement"

The document named "The Impact of Project Financial Subsidies on Project Achievement" is generally addressing an untapped significant topic that has been discussed less. However, it seems to be a mix of policy review and shallow literature review instead of concrete research and thus needs to be reviewed and adjusted to the intended one. Moreover, there are structural and writing limitations that need to be improved. More specifically, there are citation-induced reading deflections in the abstract, and the paper has not proved well if it has followed systematic scientific data collection, hence making the document generic and vague.

As the title shows, the article aims to measure the impact of financial subsidies on project achievement. Therefore, it would have been more helpful if the searcher could indicate empirical data showing the impact and if he could isolate the specific factors out of the environment and other intervening factors. There are quite a few grammatical and spelling errors which need to be reviewed. The specific themes such as policy guidelines and workshops might be changed to a more general review, unless the title can be adjusted to "The Impact of Project Financial Subsidies on Project Achievement: The Case Study on Malawi." Finally, the recommendations can be extended based on the financial subsidy negatives mentioned in the main body while proposing alternative approaches. Otherwise, the paper is informative and very useful.
