

Review of: "A Value-Driven Future Approach to Precision Medicine for Health Sustainability in New Zealand: A Perspective"

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I like the title of this manuscript, besides the nicely composed scenario. The manuscript provides a broad overview of future ahead of precision medicine in the region, which is useful and promising. However, the perspective is mostly qualitative rather than being somewhat informative based on quantities and statistics. I know it is "Perspective", but bearing in mind the availability of data in the literature (e.g., bearing in mind "Global Burden of Disease" reports), it should not be a hard deal to make this work a bit quantitative. Talking generally about the story, I am not against it at all, instead I am with that. I think it can be modified (maybe next episode can be a solution, making it qualitative as the next following episode to be published) a bit to reflect the future in the mirror of present by giving some statistical data or capturing some images as plots based on (even) a rough gauge. It is not nowadays difficult to correlate risks and hazards even with personalized medicine, considering that related database is available by far. Moreover, diverse examples in the literature exist about climate change, carbon emission, dryness of lakes, etc., which can be considered in making this report more reliable for the readers who expect touching the topic rather than scratching the surface and talking generally. Then, there will be a gauge to compare the status of New Zealand with other countries and territories in the nearby or distant. All in all, I appreciate what authors did and support this perspective, but expect more from this professional team.
