

# Review of: "Examining the Ethical and Geopolitical Context of Global Food Security Policy"

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This is a refreshing and thought-provoking essay - going beyond and deconstructing some of the jargon with regard to Food Security Policy, by questioning important ethical and geopolitical aspects of food security which are not given sufficient attention or left ambiguous in the Report. This is done through challenging what terms such as 'common problems' and 'stakeholders' may mean in this context; while arguing for a more honest and practical approach. The article's strength lies in its critical consideration of the report's assumptions and suggestions - notably with regard to disarmament, political and civil rights, and market economy - questioning their viability and ethical effects.
