The author provides a generic outline of how AI can be used in e-learning but does not have the necessary details and data to support it. E-learning has been a trending topic (source Google trends) and there is a spike in the relevance of these terms since 2020. This phenomenon is not universal as can be seen from Google Trends which highlights that these terms are more relevant where people already had access to technology.

It also does not illustrate the initiatives that are already in place by current e-learning platforms such as Khan Academy which is already leveraging GT-4 with limited release.
