My knowledge allows me to be concerned about the first part of this work. Regarding that it is a work about sociospatial segregation, I would invite the author to analyse historically what sociospatial segregation has been in Mexico, and particularly in Puebla, since the Spanish conquest. The historical reconstruction he proposes hardly deals with the discussion in his article.

In a sharp jump from the times of the of the viceroyalty of New Spain, the author argues about the impact of Mexico City's earthquake in 1985 and the changes in colective landholding in Mexico 1992. Both dynamics are not fully analyzed or exposed through data generated in both Cholulas. Finally, I want to inform the author that the Puebla-Tlaxcala metropolitan area by 2020 is close to four million people and not three as he argues,
