- 3. Our hypothesis may be improved by this type of article, such as our understanding of construction/ manufacturing, decoration processes, and even the craftsman's mind. When I was reading your text, I could imagine the movement of the craftsman's hand (especially when you were talking about Figure 2a on page 6).
- 4. These kinds of results are important for understanding changes in craftsmen's minds, finding inspiration from other cultures, and the trade (export and import) of objects and their routes.
- 5. These methods would give essential results if applied to the same decorative items such as tiling, inlay (Khatam in the Persian language), other ornamental methods, and so on.
- 6.
