- 2. The study considers sample from Lodha community, but to put as "ex- Criminal" somehow not be in sync with the title.

 Mere mentioning study on tribal community or study on Lodhas will be more suitable with the intended title.
- 3. In the introduction part it has been mentioned that "For studying women's participation in economic activity, the women who are involved in any regular income generating activity including involvement in SHGs and working as wage labourers were considered in comparison to the others who were not engaged in any earning activity". Here the authors must consider the timeframe to select samples. Reason is that to understand the impact of income on empowerment demands some time. So, it is better to consider time duration and then select respondents for the tracking of empowerment status.
