- The introduction must show the purpose of the research, importance, problem, if necessary, place a hypothesis or, failing that, a research question.
- In the abstract there seems to be a contradiction.
- It would be important to describe the areas where the research was carried out. This description refers to the number of students, infrastructure, educational level (primary, secondary, upper secondary), sanitary batteries, etc.
- To strengthen the methodological component, it is necessary that this component be described in terms of the secondary information search method. It can be bibliometrics, it can be Boolean searches, it can be searches in databases such as Jstor, ScienceDirect, among others that are relevant to your topic.
- Descriptive statistics do not refer only to tables and graphs. It is suggested that your statistics be described in terms of a more robust analysis through descriptive statistical packages such as Atlas.ti or those that allow free or valid access such as the Jasp package. Atlas.ti allows you to relate qualitative data and JASP, which is free, allows you to perform descriptive statistical analysis.

- The figures must be homogenized and better presented.
- The discussion must be adjusted and deepened with the use of quantitative data found when applying interviews and questionnaires.

References must comply with the official format of the journal.

All references must be updated, for this it is suggested that 60% of the references correspond to the last 5 years.

Of this percentage, it is suggested that they be articles that have their official credentials and that correspond to classified magazines.

The remaining 40% of the references may correspond to classic and highly necessary citations, technical reports.

All references must contain a valid link that can lead to the cited document. For magazine articles, they must contain a DOI or valid link to access the document.
