Again, there is a lot of information derived that could benefit future studies or intervention. It is fairly written/presented.

Comment: I missed getting photos characteristic of PDS work. The paper mentions perceptions of.... instead of perceptions on! This can be put right. Figure 3 has a label on maleria. Could this have been malaria? Much as their was a tendency to be quantitative in presenting results, this somehow deviated from the norms of such work. I didn't see good anecdotal excerpts to reinforce the findings presented. I also know that each FGD findings in one location may not easily be pooled with those of others. Actually, there is multiple heterogeneity across locations. I hope this informed selection of different locations and finally data analysis and conclusion. What was the difference in opinion or relationship between community animal health workers and village health teams? Do they share data on zoonotic diseases. Are their voices heard or captured by state/non-state actors. How did this inform the conception of this study?
