The section on coping strategies in times of crisis, especially the COVID-19 epidemic, is pertinent and shows how inventive the community is, but more concrete examples of home modifications would improve the conversation. The article discusses long-fallow agriculture and other sustainable practices; it would be beneficial to go into further detail on the advantages for the environment and the potential integration of contemporary methods. The conclusion provides a brief summary of the research and emphasizes the significance of traditional values in determining labor dynamics and agricultural practices. However, it would be beneficial to provide suggestions for further study or policy implications. Although there are a few small typographical mistakes and citation discrepancies that need to be fixed, the work is well-written and uses straightforward language. Though some modest adjustments are required to maximize its impact, overall, it makes a major contribution to our knowledge of how cultural values affect agricultural practices and labor distribution.
