It's important to explicitly identify where the results align with or diverge from previous research.

Furthermore, expanding on the implications of the findings for clinical practice and health policy is crucial. Providing specific recommendations based on the data would strengthen the study's practical relevance. Addressing generalisability and limitations, particularly any biases inherent in the retrospective chart review design, would contribute to a more comprehensive interpretation of the results.

The conclusion could benefit from expansion to succinctly summarise key implications and outline potential next steps arising from the research. By addressing these points, the study can further strengthen its contribution to the understanding of healthcare for refugee children and guide future research and policy initiatives.
