# **Abstract**

The term "article" should be replaced with "study"

# Introduction

- The term "outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic" is inaccurate; it should be replaced by "COVID-19 pandemic"
- In the second paragraph it is mentioned that "Dealing with infectious diseases is not a focus of care in the elderly care facilities". Could you please provide references for this claim, as control and prevention of communicable disease are one of the main concerns in these settings.
- The aim of this study is not mentioned clearly; it should be added at the end of discussion

# **Body**

- First paragraph: "on" how to use
- "Even in times of crisis, the self-determination and co-determination of nursing home residents must not be allowed to get under the wheels". This phrase is obscure and informal. It should be replaced by a more formal and clearer sentence.
- In the paragraph for caring the patients with COVID-19 symptoms, more accurate suggestions, such as the distancing
  measures and the criteria needed for sending the patient to the hospital should be mentioned.
- · Last paragraph should be entitled as "conclusion"



- In the last paragraph, the term "the corona pandemic" is inaccurate.
- There are no clear recommendations and paths for future research.
