

Review of: "The Imperative of a Comprehensive One Health Approach for Mosquito-Borne Disease Control in Indonesia"

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Although this article is intended to be a treatise on health policy concerning mosquito-borne diseases, it would be much more impressive if the author also provided technical or clinical practices to emphasize the importance of a One Health approach. For instance, the role of community-based health helpers in educating/giving more information on a lot of mosquito-borne diseases (their symptoms, the kinds of mosquitoes involved, what should be prepared and done, etc.) has not been sufficiently and properly recognized. The instances from field and clinical experiences might enhance the importance of the policy and make it more easily understood.

The author has written well about the involvement of several in-country institutes and organizations. Since this is an international publication, the writing might be better if the author explains several terms and programs that are exclusively Indonesian, for instance, "jumantik," *1R1J* program, and the like, so that all readers will have the right idea about the discussed subject.

The article is a good review of the One Health approach for the policy in mosquito-borne disease control in Indonesia, but it would be more convincing with facts and field-based evidence to show that the policy will be able to secure a One Health approach and suppress the incidence of mosquito-borne diseases in Indonesia.

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
