Overall, I recommend this manuscript for publication in Qeios with minor revisions. However, there are a few issues that need to be addressed or supplemented, as detailed below:

1. Recent research papers on tilapia feed, particularly within the last three years, should be included for comparison. According to recent studies (Refs. 1), the use of Hermetia illucens, a low-cost resource insect, feeds formulated from by-products can significantly improve the growth performance of Nile tilapia.". It would be beneficial to discuss how the findings of this study align or differ from such recent research.

2. Whenever possible, the use of figures rather than tables to present research findings is encouraged. Visual representations often provide a clearer and more concise understanding of the data, especially when dealing with complex datasets.
