This study clearly presents useful and ethically sound information on an important neglected tropical disease of public health significance, with the aim of exploring the knowledge, practices, and attitudes of a local population about buruli ulcer in Ghana. The findings could contribute to the global efforts at eliminating the disease in endemic areas of Africa.

I however find the methods lacking consistency, the writers sought to use a mixed method instead a purely qualitative approach, as this was intended to be an ethnographic study. The use of a sample size of 20, (10 cases and 10 controls) in a case-control study is too small to make accurate epidemiological deductions from the findings. Again, the overall text information in the manuscript is too long, as the background and findings could be presented more succinctly for readers.
